Semantics of Faith in Hebrews 11:1

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- The author of Hebrews: unknown (cf. the masculine singular pronoun and participle in ἐπιλείψει με γὰρ διηγούμενον ὁ χρόνος . . . in Heb 11:32)
 - o Origen of Alexandria, "Only God knows who wrote Hebrews."
- The addressees of Hebrews: a Jewish-Christian community in crisis?
- In Hebrews 13:22, the author calls the text he wrote "a word of exhortation (ὁ λόγος τῆς παρακλήσεως).
- The overarching theme of Hebrews: $\pi i \sigma \tau i \varsigma$ / faith
 - O The noun πίστις appears 243 times in NT and 32 of them are in Hebrews.
- Hebrews 11:1 provides not a connotative but a *functional* definition of π ίστις.
- The "definition formula" in Classical Greek: ἔστιν + an anarthrous noun as the subject (to be defined) + an anarthrous noun as the predicate (as the definition)
 - "Εστιν + πίστις (subject) + ὑπόστασις (predicate 1) ---, & ἔλεγχος (predicate 2) -- (Heb 11:1)
- The noun ὑπόστασις (ὑπο + ἴστημι): that which stands underneath, foundation, substance
- The noun ἔλεγχος (< ἐλέγχω): cross-examination, proof/disproof, evidence
- My translation of Heb 11:1: Faith is what sustains things that are hoped for, what provides proof for things that cannot be seen.
- In Hebrews, the Logos invites its hearers to the way of hope (ἐλπίς, 3:6, 6:11, 18, 7:19, 10:23), endurance (μακροθυμία, 6:12), and perseverance (ὑπομονή, 10:36, 12:1), which is built on and sustained by faith (πίστις).
- In Hebrews, the followers of Jesus yearn for the will of God (τὸ θέλημα τοῦ θεοῦ, 10:36)
 to be done on earth. --- invisible (πραγμάτων οὐ βλεπομένων) as of now; no proof except faith (i.e. faith is the only proof)
- Augustine of Hippo
 - o fides quae creditur (faith which is believed) --- creeds, confessions, doctrines
 - o fides qua criditur (faith by which it is believed) --- trust in God
